

## Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

**1. Q:** Why do I have to complete part B of the permit and drop it in the box when I finish hunting?

**A:** The information you provide on Part B is used in making management decisions. Accurate information is vital to making good management decisions.

**2. Q:** What do I do about getting the daily permit if I access Corps lands from private lands and don't need to go near a permit check-in station?

**A:** All hunters using Corps property are required to comply with the permit regulations regardless of their point of entry. Permit check-in stations have been as conveniently located as possible. In addition, an online annual hunting permit is now available.

**3. Q:** Can I hunt small game in an Archery Only Area after deer season?

**A:** Yes

**4. Q:** Can I leave my portable deer stand on Corps Property overnight if I plan on coming back in early the next day?

**A:** No

**5. Q:** Where and when can I use dogs to small game on Corp' land?

**A:** During deer season, small game hunting with dogs is restricted to All-Game areas. After deer season, small game hunting with dogs is allowed on all open hunting lands.

**6. Q:** When waterfowl hunting can I legally access any land that is accessible by boat?

**A:** All waters that are connected to the Tenn-Tom are public waters. In most cases, the land under the water is privately owned. Hunters must have written permission before wading or walking on private property.

**7. Q:** Is feeding/baiting allowed on Corps Property?

**A:** No.
